Also, please don't forget to apply for the new \$500 Celebration Grants available to all chapters during the Wright Administration.



Our mockingbird has resumed his duties as head of the area and is often on his hummingbird feeder crook or at the top of a cedar. I was getting so used to hearing him again that I almost did not notice a catbird going on about something on the 6th. I have often been surprised by how late they linger before migrating but am always thankful that they're here longer. I have seen them as late as October 25th.

Several people have mentioned that hummingbird numbers seem to be down this year. We did not see our usual amounts, and our feeders never ran out, for the first time.

We had another gullfest on the 7th around 5 o'clock, in bright sunlight, also over land, not over the river. There were not as many and were flying much faster, not on a steady counter-clockwise, elongated circle path, much more helterskelter. This gave rise to more near collisions. Usually both birds slowed almost to a stop, and altered their directions to avoid each other, then quickly resumed their breakneck pace. As before, suddenly their numbers decreased, and in a few minutes, all were gone.

I see the great blue heron at Bull Run almost every day and I have heard blue jays frequently. The geese numbers seem to have declined considerably, so the mallards are back along the edge of the river. All the robins I saw in the woods and in the cemetery are nowhere to be seen, but we know we'll see flocks from time to time, all winter.

In early 2021 University of Delaware scientists installed a tracking system tower on the roof of the Delaware Museum of Nature and Science as part of an international collaborative research network dedicated to tracking the migration of small birds, especially purple martins. These towers read the transmitter tags on birds that fly within about nine miles. The museum's tower has logged more than 3,200 readings.

This July 13th it detected a lesser yellowlegs that had been banded in Colombia in April and was detected in Missouri and Michigan before it was detected by the museum's and five other Delaware towers. I do not think that any banded bird will be able to travel in secret now.

Many more homeowners and heads of businesses have invested in renewable energy, resulting in lower costs so that more will make these choices. On the 27th the News Journal reported that because interest rates have been, "shooting up, several Delaware businesses and agencies are teaming up on a possible solution – a small, modular, super energy-efficient home.

"These solar-powered houses could eliminate monthly bills for electricity, heating and cooling. These homes have higher-than-normal insulation in the walls, roof and floor, an all-electric heating and cooling system with high-efficiency heat-pump technology, well insulated, draft-free windows and doors, and high-efficiency appliances and lighting. They will have 'zero net' energy costs. They were recently honored with two awards from the Department of Energy."

The Associated Press reported on the 1st, "The Environmental Protection Agency is increasing funds for electric school buses from \$500 million to \$964 million across the country. The agency has received requests for more than 12,000 buses. About 1% of the nation's 480,000 buses were electric as of last year."

On the 28th the News Journal reported, "A prototype, all-electric airplane took its first flight in Washington state. If the Federal Aviation Administration certifies the plane to carry passengers, it could become the first all-electric commercial airplane. It was built to carry nine passengers and two pilots and is powered by 21,500 small Tesla-style battery cells."

On the 11th USA Today reported that a major airline, "has invested in a company that hopes to deliver hydrogen for use in planes. The hydrogen company expects to deliver hydrogen for regional aircraft in 2025 and to larger, single-aisle aircraft as a primary fuel by the mid-2030s. The airline cast its investment as a vote of confidence in hydrogen becoming a key element of a sustainable aviation industry."

High-flying birds and people who work in airports or live near them, as well as all the nearby creatures, will probably benefit hugely from breathing cleaner air.

Special guests included Honorary State Regents Virginia Trader and Dr. Gloria Lester, Delaware Sons of the American Revolution President Larry Josefowski, Councilman and First State National Historical Park Superintendent (ret.) Russ Smith. Also in attendance were Dawn Clair, State Recording Secretary, and Sarah O'Donnell, State Corresponding Secretary.

Following the meeting, a memorial tribute was held at the graveside of Gertrude Ross Till Read, who is interred at Immanuel Episcopal Church on the Green. A luncheon catered by Zollie's Jazz Cucina was held at the Academy Building.

The Battell and Chapter name honors the historic contributions of two Delaware daughters, while proudly displaying the face of #TodaysDAR. Elizabeth Empson Battell and Gertrude Ross Till Read came from different counties (Kent and New Castle) and diverse socio-economic classes, but both worked tirelessly to support and keep Delaware united in the cause for independence. Though very different, they were clearly empowered to do what needed to be done and made significant contributions to the history of the American Revolution in Delaware.

Lewes DAR supports new upstate chapter
