Constitution Week September 17 – 23, 2022

History of Constitution Week:

In 2022, we recognize the 67th anniversary of Constitution Week. NSDAR Past President General Gertrude S. Carraway was responsible for the annual designation of September 17-23 as Constitution Week. The DAR made its own resolution for Constitution Week, which was adopted on April 21, 1955.

Members of the United States Congress received the DAR resolution and on June 7, 1955, the resolution was discussed in the

Senate. The first resolution to observe Constitution Week was made on June 14, 1955, by Senator William F. Knowland of California. Following the passage of the resolution by both Houses of Congress, President Eisenhower issued his proclamation on August 19, 1955.

The first observance of Constitution Week was so successful that on January 5, 1956, Senator Knowland introduced a Senate Joint Resolution to have the President designate September 17-23 annually as Constitution Week. The resolution was adopted on July 23, 1956, and signed into Public Law 915 on August 2, 1956.

For his patriotic aid and interest, Senator Knowland received an Award of Commendation from the NSDAR Continental Congress in April 1956.

At our September 17 meeting, we will put together a tri-fold display for Constitution Week (arts and crafts anyone?). I have ordered the following posters to use but please bring paper, ribbon, stickers, or any other item you think might help to make it interesting!



I am ordering a set of tri-fold displays (use one now and save the rest for later). "Takeaways" such a pocket-sized Constitution booklets will be available and I will make bookmarks as well. If you have additional ideas, they are welcome!



Proclamations from the City and the State have been requested and can be displayed with the tri-fold. After the meeting we will take it to the New Castle Public Library located at 424 Delaware Street where it will be placed in the reading circle for patrons to view and pick up handouts. I have asked Julie Kirk (Librarian Extraordinaire!) to select some adult and children's books to add to the display.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMITTEES:

America 250!

In 2026, our country will turn 250 years old! Let's get our chapter and our community excited about this with events and meetings that inspire us and provide great PR opportunities. Find ways to recognize our chapters patriots by highlighting a different patriot in our newsletter, at meetings, or on FB. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years and work closely with our PR committee.

American Heritage

Promotes preservation of American cultural traditions by encouraging members to enter the State and National contests in the following divisions: Arts, Crafts, Drama, Literature, and Music. The theme changes every year (in 2021, the theme was *Rise & Shine your Light on our House Beautiful*). This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years.

Commemorative Events

Promotes historic anniversaries to our membership and encourages members to participate in these celebrations and remembrances. Vietnam War veterans will be recognized 2022-25 as well as patriotic holidays such as Fourth of July, Memorial Day, and more! This committee could brainstorm and work with many other committees like DAR Service of Veterans, C.A.R., and American History. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years.

DAR Genealogy Preservation

Assists in preserving and indexing DAR records that include genealogical, organizational, and membership information.

DAR Museum Outreach

Educates our members about all the wonderful things and exhibits at the DAR Museum in DC. You could pick an item to discuss at a meeting, FB Post about an upcoming exhibit or organize a field trip for the chapter to go to DC or another museum. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years.

Genealogical Records

The GRC is a vital part of expanding the collection of original records in DAR's world-class library. The GRC has been serving all members of the DAR since 1913 and collected millions of records to assist daughters with their research. All the records are searchable in the Genealogical Research System under the GRC tab. Do you have a family bible? Do you have family papers that you would like to share? Do you enjoy visiting and mapping cemeteries? We are the committee for you! See our <u>Detailed Information page</u> for more information.

Historic Preservation

Oversees the awarding of DAR Historic Preservation Grants; the Historic Preservation Medal and Historic Preservation Recognition Award, as well as documenting historic sites and properties owned, maintained or operated by DAR chapters and state societies. This committee could also make

Patriotic Records Project

Assists in indexing records pertaining to the Revolutionary War (done through National)

Special Project Grants/Celebration Grants

What better way to celebrate, inform your community about the founding of our nation and the Patriots that achieved American Independence, encourage the study of family history, and promote DAR membership than to provide your chapter or state society with a \$500 grant as a gift of this administration? EDUCATION COMMITTEES:

American History

Promotes American history by honoring significant historical people, places, dates, and events. This committee is in charge of the America History Contest for grades 5-8 (theme for essay changes every year), the Patriots of the American Revolution DAR High School Essay Contest, and recognizes Women in American History by selecting a notable woman in the community to honor. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years and work some with Women's Issues Committee.

American Indians

Alerts members regarding the needs of Native American youth and supports and learns about the Native American Schools that DAR supports. You could also give an American Indian minute at as many meetings as you wish. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years and may work with the Community Classroom Committee.

DAR Leadership Training

Enroll or have taken the DAR Members Course, New Horizons, and/or Committee Leaders Course and help to encourage and guide others to take the courses as well.

Community Classroom

Current Teachers and past teachers would be perfect for this committee. This committee encourages Daughters to volunteer support to teachers and children in classrooms and schools in their own communities throughout the nation, as well as overseas. Included within this committee is Educational Resources which offers electronic lesson plans for DAR members and non-DAR members focusing on America, its history, government, heritage and genealogy, as well as related language and/or math topics. These lesson plans can be used for Girl and Boy Scouts and other children's groups. This committee could work with American Indian, DAR Schools, and C.A.R.

Conservation

Inspire your fellow Daughters to make good conservation choices! Educate members at meetings with a Conservation Minute. The National Committee web page has everything covered for you. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years.

Constitution Week

Help publicize Constitution Week September 17-24 by finding a place (store window, library, town hall) to set up a Constitution Week display for the week! There are posters available at the DAR Store *and* use your own creativity. Also, have a Constitution minute at any of meeting that you wish and lead the Preamble to the Constitution of the United States of America at our meetings. You would work with the PR Committee to maximize the exposure.

DAR Good Citizens

Promote dependability, service, leadership and patriotism among high school seniors by presenting a chapter award to a high school senior by contacting the local high schools and having each school send the chair their candidate. We would award each school's choice. Candidates should have the following:

- Dependability (truthfulness, honesty, punctuality, etc.
- Service (cooperation, helpfulness, responsibility, etc.
- Leadership (personality, self-control, initiative, etc.
- Patriotism (unselfish loyalty to American ideals

This committee should work with the PR Committee.

DAR Library Outreach

The goal is to promote and support not only our renowned DAR library but those libraries within our own states and local communities. One of the Wright Administration's named goals is "...to highlight historic preservation, education, and patriotism in unique, local, and impactful ways. All Daughters know the value of our beloved DAR Library; however, we also know the value of our local libraries. They often offer meeting spaces, computer facilities, house histories of our local communities, offer study spaces, and are a wealth of resources as well as a wealth of knowledge.

We need our members' help to support and nourish these important community resources. The DAR Library Outreach Committee's work will be a team effort. The team begins with our Division Vice Chairs, who will engage the State Librarians, and they will in turn strive to engage chapter librarians and members to discover, support, and promote our state and local libraries.

DAR Scholarship

Thousands of dollars are awarded through NSDAR for American history, political science, history, government, historic preservation, economics, music, nursing, medical and occupational therapy scholarships annually.

DAR Schools

Inform and enlighten our chapter about the 5 DAR Schools: Kate Duncan Smith, Berry College, Crossnore, Hillside, and Hindman. You can organize a drive to donate items for one of these schools. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years.

Junior American Citizens

Citizenship training program for boys and girls, kindergarten through high school. JAC Clubs are available to parochial, private, public and homeschooled students.

Literacy Promotion

Promotes adult literacy and involvement in literacy programs. Enlighten our chapter about the issue of literacy for both adults and children. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years.

Women's Issues

Educates members about current issues, such as health, career, finance, and family, that are important to today's women. This committee emphasizes how DAR can become an integral part of the lives of women of all ages. Encourage members to enter the National Women's Essay Contest. Issues can include health, career, family, and concerns of women veterans. This committee would also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years. A women's issue minute could be given at as many meetings as you could attend.

GENEALOGY COMMITTEES

Lineage Research

Those knowledgeable in genealogy assist prospective members and hold workshops.

Volunteer Genealogists

Promotes GEP training and serves as a Volunteer Field Genealogist or Volunteer Genealogist by assisting with local applications and Electronic Applications.

DAR Genealogy Preservation

Assists in preserving and indexing DAR records that include genealogical, organizational, and membership information.

PATRIOTISM COMMITTEES

Americanism

Promotes knowledge, loyalty and love of country for American citizens, whether naturalized or citizens by birth; awards the DAR Medal of Honor (for an American citizen by birth) and the DAR Americanism Medal for a naturalized American citizen who has had citizenship for at least 5 years. Activities can include assisting naturalization classes and ceremonies. This committee would also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years.

Children of the American Revolution (C.A.R.)

Do you have children or grandchildren (ages 0-22) who are or can be in C.A.R.? If so, this is the committee for you! This is an amazing committee that will provide you with a chance to do something with your children or grandchildren. Wonderful aunts and members with no children very much welcome as well to serve. Being involved in the C.A.R. will make your an even better DAR member.

Community Service Awards

The Community Service Awards Committee provides a unique opportunity for chapters and states to provide a non-competitive recognition to worthy individuals and organizations for outstanding voluntary service. Examples of previously recognized service include unpaid achievements in cultural, educational, humanitarian, patriotic, historical, citizenship, or environmental conservation endeavors. Our chapter may present a limit of two (2) awards per NSDAR year (January 1-December 31). Community Service Awards are for recognition of service activities outside of DAR, so DAR members are eligible as long as their service is not related to their DAR activities. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years

DAR Project Patriot

Let those currently serving know that we are thinking of them. Develop projects to send cards and care packages to our military. Support our State Project Patriot project and send items to our Nationally approved centers. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years

DAR Service for Veterans

As a member of the National Veterans Administration Voluntary Service Advisory Committee (VAVS), DAR has representatives in Veterans Administration (VA) Medica Centers. DAR members volunteer in VA facilities and in state- and community-based programs. Let's show our support for our veterans with community-based programs, donating gifts, cash, personal care items and hours of time in service to America's veterans. You will also be working on Wreaths Across America. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years and work with the Women's Issue Committee.

National Defense & ROTC Awards

This chair would read an article from the National Defender at every meeting. Other activities could include presenting Gold ROTC, Bronze JROTC, and Silver Outstanding Cadet medals; scheduling a chapter program on national defense; and presenting DAR Youth Citizenship and DAR Distinguished Citizen Medals. This committee could also make suggestions and find possible speakers for at least one of our meetings in the next 3 years.

Service to America

This Committee encourages members to provide meaningful community service in order to promote historic preservation, education and patriotism. You would encourage members to log their hours on line and offer to log in hours for members not comfortable with logging them on their own. The committee could organize and encourage members to celebrate the founding of our Society by participating in the National DAR Day of Service on or near October 11 (the Day DAR was founded).

The Flag of the United States of America

Lead the pledge at every meeting and give a short flag fact at some of our regular meetings. Find places that our chapter can distribute flags (including Braille flags), flag codes, certificates to places that are displaying the flag properly and other patriotic literature annually.

Wreaths Across America

Assist the State Chair in garnering support and sponsorship for wreaths. Participate in the laying of the wreaths at local veteran cemeteries.

MEMBERSHIP/ADMINISTRATIVE/SPECIAL COMMITTEES

Budget

The treasurer and three other members of the committee will prepare the budget and present it at our Annual Meeting.

DAR Magazine

Super easy committee. Simply subscribe and promote the subscription of the DAR Magazine. The number of subscriptions that we have as a chapter will be given to you to report the chapter. You will also work with PR Chair on an article about our chapter once a year to be sent to the National Magazine.

Financial Review

Per our by-laws, the two members of the committee will examine the treasurer's records at the close of the fiscal year and report at the annual meeting.

Insignia

Do you understand DAR pins? Wonderful! Be a resource to help your fellow members buy and arrange pins.

Junior Membership

A Junior is a DAR member 18 years of age through 35 years of age. She holds full DAR membership, and when qualified, may serve as an officer or committee chair at the chapter, state, and national levels. All chapters are encouraged to find ways to help junior members sparkle not only by recruiting Juniors to join your chapter but encouraging them to engage in chapter activities and in DAR service. Every State Regent appoints a Junior Membership Committee chair who works closely with the chapter Junior membership chairs within her state to recruit new Juniors, encourage Juniors to be active, potentially host a Junior "Event", and to raise money for the <u>Helen Pouch Memorial Fund</u>.**

- The DAR Gold ROTC medal is awarded to a college or university graduated being commissioned to one of the US Armed Forces (one medal per ROTC unit).
- The DAR Bronze JROTC medal is awarded to either a junior or senior student in a secondary school JROTC program or to a graduating junior college participant in a ROTC program
- The DAR Outstanding Cadet Silver medal is awarded to a student for exemplary participation in a non-ROTC military such as an affiliated cadet program funded by the school or privately, such as the Naval Sea Cadet Corps, Civil Air Patrol Cadet Program, National Defense Cadet Corps, Young Marines, California Wing Cadet Programs, Navy League Cadet Corps and Joint Military Cadets of America. One medal per year per cadet unit is awarded.
- The DAR Youth Citizenship medal is awarded to a boy or a girl in grades five through 12 (one medal per grade per school) who, in the judgment of the school faculty, best exemplifies the qualities of honor, service, courage, leadership and patriotism. The medal may also be awarded to youth in service and patriotic organizations.
- The DAR Distinguished Citizen medal is presented to an individual, 18 years of age or older, and groups that exemplify the qualities of honor, service, courage, leadership and patriotism. This medal may be awarded to emergency first responders, emergency health responders, active-duty military and veterans of the United States Armed Forces and citizens who have contributed to the defense, security, or freedom of the community, state or nation in an exceptional manner.

Flag of the United States

• Present flag certificates and your communities to individuals and/or groups who fly the flag continually and fly it correctly.
